

The **"epiphany"** of Jesus, his revelation to the world, was accompanied by the offering of three gifts, each of which symbolized a different aspect of the divine/human saviour.

Frankincense is offered to Jesus, the Son of God, the eternal Word of the father who is worshiped with Father and the Spirit. *Gold* is offered to Jesus the King of the human race, the summit of creation.

Myrrh is offered to the divine/human saviour of the world who suffered and died for the salvation of all.

Jesus is revealed in our own day also. He is revealed as the Word of God speaking to us in the marvelous workings of nature, in the achievements of the human spirit, and in the dialogue between Church and world.

Jesus perfected revelation by fulfilling and manifesting himself: through His words and deeds, His signs and wonders, but especially through His death and glorious resurrection from the dead and final sending of the Spirit of Truth.



And Now, A Word from Our Pastor

Can you imagine the conversation during the journey of the Wise Men? "No, Melchior, the book said to take a left at Baghdad." "I know, Balthasar, but the Star seems to be turning to the right. What do you think, Caspar?" "I think we should ask for directions." And they did. The Gospel says they inquired: "Where is the One Who has been born King?"

Why is it that we so often resist asking for help? Something as simple as "Which way is the Metro" to something as important as "I've got a dilemma; do you have a moment to talk?" If the Wise Men hadn't asked, they might still be wandering around. The humility to ask someone for help doesn't mean we're going to get an infallible answer, but it may give us an insight we'd never considered.
